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The Thanksgiving Feast

Did you know that Thanksgiving may be the most Biblical of all holidays? We often think of Christmas as being the most "Christian" holiday, especially at this time of year, and in a way it is because at Christmas, we celebrate the birth of the Christ. There are many great lessons that can be taught from the nativity narrative. We can learn from the humility of Mary, the obedience of Joseph, the faithfulness of the Magi, the wonder of the shepherds, the ruthlessness of Herod and the great love of God in sending a Savior into the world to redeem the world. But in terms of telling us exactly how and why special days were to be celebrated in Scripture, Thanksgiving is the most Biblically defined.

The feasts of the Old
Testament were not only
looking backward, but also
looking forward to the coming
of Christ. They were a shadow
of things to come. "Therefore
let no one pass judgment on
you in questions of food and
drink, or with regard to a
festival or a new moon or a

Sabbath. These are a shadow of the things to come, but the substance belongs to

Christ." (Colossians 2:16-17 ESV) Imagine Jesus approaching you with the sun behind Him. Even before Jesus reaches you, you will see His approaching shadow. A feast functions like a "Shadow" of things to come. In fact there are seven feasts that mark special occasions in the Scripture and they are shadows of the reality that would be fulfilled because of Christ's birth.

The Feast of Unleavened Bread (Hag Ha Matzah) was a week of eating bread made without yeast (Matzah), to remember how God brought the Israelites out of Egypt in haste. It is also a picture of our salvation through Christ from the bondage of sin, for the leaven is seen as a symbol of sin.

The Feast of First Fruits (Yom Ha Bikkurim) was the harvest offering on the first day after the Sabbath after Passover. It is also a picture of Jesus' resurrection: He is "the firstfruits" from the dead (1 Corinthians 15:20)

The Feast of Weeks or Pentecost (Shavuoth) celebrates the time of the giving of the Law to Moses on Mount Sinai. The offering is made fifty days after Passover (hence: Pentecost). It is also a picture of the Holy Spirit that was poured out on the Day of Pentecost, fifty days after the resurrection of Jesus.

The Feast of Trumpets (Rosh Hashanah) this celebrates the beginning of the Jewish civil year. It is both a time of rejoicing as well as a holy occasion. Shofars (Ram's horns) are blown to proclaim a gathering for worship. It is also a picture of the Second Coming of Jesus Christ, when the final trumpet shall sound and the age to come shall begin.

The Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur) is the holiest day of the Jewish year when sacrifices for sins of the nation were made. It is also a picture of how Christ fulfilled our needed atonement on the cross by becoming our perfect sacrifice

The Feast of Tabernacles or of Booths (Succoth) recalls 40 years of wandering in the wilderness, living in tents (booths) and worshiping in a portable tabernacle. It is also a picture of the church age, which we are now in; one day we will shed both these booths (bodies) for new

booths made for our eternal place with God.

Finally, *Pesach* (Passover) commemorates the Exodus from Egypt, Israel's deliverance from Egypt. It is also a wonderful picture of Christ, our Passover lamb, in it "He has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son," (Colossians 1:13 ESV)

Each of these feasts was marked by four things. They share amazing similarities to our feast of Thanksgiving.

Gathering of Community: Everyone in the nation would take part in these holidays. All focus was on the special occasion. Thanksgiving gathers us together as a community. This is important because it involves: "Not only your family, but millions of Americans". The community will come together for a celebration, each home celebrating in their own way.

Giving of Thanks: During each of these feasts, the nation of Israel would pray and give thanks to God for all of His blessings. We are called as a nation to give thanks, but even though we all take Thanksgiving off from work, most of us forget to thank God for the multitude of blessings. We often forget to give thanks because we forget why we should, which is the third mark of these feasts.

Remembrance: Each feast brought the things of God to mind in a specific way, they are a call to remember God's mighty acts. Thanksgiving should bring to our mind thoughts of God's blessing on our nation. Thanksgiving is explicitly Biblical when God is at the center of our thanks.

Feast: In every Old Testament holiday there was an accompanying feast. Arguably the best part of the Thanksgiving tradition and the only part that is universally observed in this nation. It amazes me sometimes how important food is in Scripture as a figure. Jesus referred to Himself as the bread of life and as Living Water. Heaven is symbolized by a wedding feast. The greatest feast we share as Christians is the Lord's Supper. In it we gather together as a community of believers. We thank God for the sacrifice of His Son. We remember the promise we have through Him and "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes." (1 Corinthians 11:26 ESV)

We who are the beneficiaries of God's great grace should be most thankful not just at this time of year but every day. We ought to sing with David ". . . Bless the LORD, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name! Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits, who forgives all your iniquity, who heals all your diseases, who redeems your life from the pit, who crowns you with steadfast love and mercy, who satisfies you with good so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's. (Psalm 103:1-5 ESV) We are the objects of God's grace; let him be the object of our gratitude.

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November has been a very pleasant experience this year. We had great weather most of the month.

The first weekend of the month we were able to spend some time with Roy and Bennie Gee as they had come for a Thanksqiving celebration at the Petersburg Church of God.
