Be kind to one another

We saw last month that if we want to get rid of our hostility, our anger, our unwholesome words, Paul tells us to "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you." (Ephesians 4:32) We looked at "Be kind to one another" last month so we will examine "be compassionate" this month.

In the Gospel we see Jesus being moved with compassion when He sees a need, "When He went ashore, He saw a large crowd, and felt compassion for them and healed their sick." (Matthew 14:14) Jesus saw two blind men sitting by the road, "Moved with compassion, Jesus touched their eyes; and immediately they regained their sight and followed Him". (Matthew 20: 34) "And a leper came to Jesus, ... Moved with compassion, Jesus stretched out His hand and touched him, and said to him, "I am willing; be cleansed." Immediately the leprosy left him and he was cleansed. (Mark 1:40-42) "When Jesus went

ashore, He saw a large

crowd, and He felt compassion for them because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and He began to teach them many things." (Mark 6:34)

"I feel compassion for the people because they have remained with Me now three days and have nothing to eat. (Mark 8:2) and He fed them.

A widow of Nain who is burying her dead son finds the compassion of the Lord. When the Lord saw her, He felt compassion for her, and said to her, "Do not weep." And He came up and touched the coffin; and the bearers came to a halt. And He said, "Young man, I say to you, arise!" The dead man sat up and began to speak. And Jesus gave him back to his mother. (Luke 7: 13-15)

Jesus saw, He touched, He healed, he fed, He taught, He raised the dead, all out of a heart of compassion. The word "compassion" simply means that your feelings become a part of my life, and I begin to share and



understand what you feel and what is going on inside of you, and if I can, I do something to ease the need, to

assuage the pain. You might argue, "I'm not Jesus I can't do what He can do" and you're right, but often we do far less than what we can do and too often we harden our hearts to people rather than having compassion.

Let's suppose for a moment that it was Saturday night and you wanted to go to a movie. You're running late for the movie because you got home late and then once you put down the keys, you forgot where you put them. It was frustrating but you did find them. You finally jump into the car and you're on your way making good time until you come up behind a blue car. You are on a two lane road with a solid yellow line down the middle which means no passing. The car in front of you is doing twenty in a thirty five mile an hour zone. You think, "I want to grab some popcorn before the movie starts". You are starting to get mad and frustrated and you wonder where the person in front of you got their license.

Now let me ask, would it make a difference to you, if

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you knew that driver was heading home from the hospital to an empty house? She had driven to the hospital an hour earlier. Her husband of 40 years and her only son had arrived at the hospital dead after being in a car accident. She didn't have anyone left she could call on to come and drive her home. She was crying and driving 20 miles an hour in a 35 mph zone right in front of you because that was the best she could do through her tears. I would hope that if you had known this, you would have still been late for the movie, but you would have had some compassion. You would have prayed for her. What you would have done is that you would have put yourself in her place and you would have understood.

Do you know why we don't treat people with more grace and more love? It's because we do not put ourselves in their place. We even think the way we see people, is the way they really are. Yet not a single one of us can look at a person and see what's in his or her heart. We all have some issues in our lives that need to be dealt with, some hurts that needs to be healed and some pain that that needs to be healed and some pain that that needs to be eased. If we are going to make a difference in the lives of others for God, we are going to have to put ourselves in their place. Henry W. Longfellow wrote, "If we could read the secret history of our enemies, we should find in each man's life sorrow and suffering enough to disarm all hostility."

In a family torn by dissension and argument, "Be kind and compassionate to one another..." In a business where the general rule seems to be "dog eat dog" "Be kind and compassionate to one another..." In a community and nation where one race is pitted against another and tolerance is derided, "Be kind and compassionate to one another..." In a world that is torn asunder by deep and long-standing hatreds that never seem to be assuaged, "Be kind and compassionate to one another..."

You see the cycle will not be broken until there is kindness and compassion, until we begin to understand what is going on inside of others and open the door of compassion to a broken world. The sad truth is that the broken world is found in our family, our church, our neighborhood and in our own heart, may we be kind and compassionate to one another to heal our part of this broken world.
