

What Do You Say?

Every time and place has its great spiritual struggles. One of ours today is against the growth of Islam. The Muslim mind thinks that nothing could be more foolish than to believe that God's perfect Son was brutally murdered for the redemption of mankind. Their whole philosophy says, "Our God is too great to die." But long before Mohammad, Greek religion said the same, calling the cross foolishness. And modern liberals agree, their antipathy to the cross is astounding. From the World Counsel of Churches: "One of the most pernicious aspects of Christian teaching has been this imposed theology of sacrifice and suffering." And at the ReImagining Conference, Delores Williams dismissed Christ's atonement altogether: "I don't think we need a theory of atonement at all. I don't think we need folks hanging on crosses and blood dripping and weird stuff.... We just need to listen to the god within."

I quote these to remind us of how it offends people that our only hope of life is God's death. People get angry when Jesus insists that the only thing they bring to salvation is their sin and that they have to depend on His grace. Pastor Glenn Durham writes, "Others may follow a god too great to die. Christians follow a God so great that He died."

We must understand who Jesus is and what he did. "Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and by believing you may have life in his name." (John 20.30-31) Jesus' signs insist that He is the living Savior and that this living Savior offers us life.

What are some of the signs? First, Jesus changing water to wine (John 2:1-11) Points to Jesus as the source of all the blessings of God's future (see Isaiah 25:6-8; Jeremiah 31:11-12; Amos 9:13-14) Second, Jesus healing the official's son (John 4:43-54) points to Jesus as the Giver of life. Third, Jesus healing the

invalid at Bethesda (John 5:1-15) points to Jesus as the Father's Coworker. Fourth, Jesus feeding the five

thousand (John 6:1-15, 25-69) points to Jesus as the lifegiving Bread from heaven. Fifth, Jesus walking on water (John 6:16-21) points to Jesus as the divine I AM. Sixth, Jesus healing the man born blind (John 9:1-41) points to Jesus as the Giver of spiritual sight. Seventh, Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead (John 11:1-44), points to Jesus as the Resurrection and the Life. From Holman's Book of Biblical Charts, Maps and Reconstructions

Even Jesus' enemies acknowledge his signs: John 11:47 Therefore the chief priests and the Pharisees convened a council, and were saying, "What are we doing? For this man is performing many signs. Our problem never is a lack of proof. No extra evidence would convict these folk, they already agreed with the evidence. They saw the signs. The problem is the hardness of their hearts. Faith in Jesus as the Christ would mean losing position, power and prestige: John 11.48: "If we let him go on like this, everyone will believe in him, and the


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Romans will come and take away both our place and our nation." Though it appears in different forms, the same reasoning keeps people from following Jesus today.

The patriarch Job survived boils, bankruptcy and bereavement and came out with his faith intact. Let's look at the creed he lived by: (1) "I know." When you can say, "I know," you're an exclamation point in a world of question marks. Job didn't say, "I have been told." What he knew about God, he knew through experience and personal revelation. Is such a life possible? Yes, "You have an anointing from the Holy One, and you know all things" (1Jn 2:20 NKJV). You can "know" things about God in your heart that you can't fully understand or explain. Why? Because they're spiritually discerned. (2) "That my Redeemer lives."
